Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As this Pulpit Rock goes to “press” the season of Lent will be upon us. Many have a negative view or feeling about Lent. That’s understandable, some religious leaders use it as a time to make us feel lowly and unworthy. The word “Lent” though is itself full of hope and worth- as the season is meant to be. “Lent” is derived from the Latin word for the season of spring, it literally means to lengthen daylight. The word and the season look forward to the hope in darkness of winter/life that extended sun/Son light will bring. Simply put, it can be understood as a season to positively prepare for Easter. The ashes, fasting and other Lenten rituals remind us to prepare for that momentous day on the Christian calendar by making serious efforts at transformation, turning away from things that keep us from being our best. See, Lent, like Easter, is about the transformation and the resurrection of each of us.

There are those who think Lent must be a time to consider sin makes us all unworthy, that’s not true. The whole point of Jesus’ teaching, life, death and

resurrection is that we are worthy. All. Of. Us. That’s what the “For God so loved the world” part of John 3:16 is all about. Jesus did not do what he did – and God did do what God did– that first Holy Week because we have no worth. What happened, happened because we were and are worth it. We– YOU– are worthy.

Spring is the season of transformation from the dark stark cold of winter to the bright green warmth and renewal of life. Lent too can be understood as a season of hope. There is a hope offered of spring-like renewal in us through Christianity, the following of Jesus’ Way. Have we made mistakes? Yes. Are some of them big? Yes. Have we made worse mistakes or more than others? Probably some yes, some, no. But the past – whatever it is– can’t hold us down, we can move past it.

All the talk of ashes and rebirth at Lent reminds us that we can choose to place all those mistakes on the ash heap of time and from the present onward arise like a phoenix into new life.

Lent is the time of year when we reflect on that pile of ashes and Jesus’ Way – our Way– out of it. That reflection can be disturbing, it can be humbling, but it is not because we are unworthy, it is because the opposite is true, we are worthy of living a better life with more of Love. And God is Love!

Jesus lived a life that tragically ended. Rome and even Jesus’ followers thought his death on the cross meant that his body would return to earth, ashes to ashes. But he arose from those ashes and lives on.

He lives on in us. Here and now. The church is the Body of Christ and each of us are called to look inward and find and provide as much love as we can, in each moment.

There is another metaphor for the hope of the season, the diamond. Ashes are carbon, and carbon is the very thing that creation in a certain way turns to diamonds. Lent is about the diamond Jesus' life is for us. It is also about how we can make diamonds of our life from whatever pile of ashes we find ourselves in at this moment. We are all diamonds in the making. Lent is a time when we give deep and meaningful thought to the truth and hope of that good news.

PEACE VILLAGE LEADERSHIP TEAM BEING FORMED

Would you like to work on forming a community interfaith

peace camp for children? Well, Nahant Village Church is doing just that. We're forming a leadership team to create Nahant "Peace Village."

Peace Village is a tried and true summer camp designed to thoughtfully teach peaceful practices to children through classes, music, art, interfaith peace stories, and of course fun and adventure in the great outdoors. We are intentionally seeking to make this an interfaith friendly effort open to the community and plan to arrange for peace storytellers from multiple faith communities to speak with children. The camp will be August 14th - 18th, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at Flash Road Playground.

We expect the camp to be filled to capacity with thirty children from grades 1 to 6. It takes a village to put on a Peace Village, which means we need volunteers. Scott and Jen McCarthy will co-lead this effort but they need a core team of other adults who like working with children to create the Nahant Peace Village.

If you are one of the many in this great church community who have been hoping or asking or praying

that our church would find a way to do something special for children, or restart summer camps, or work for peace, then join us. Speaking of interfaith work did you know that Rev. Scott has a history of successfully bringing together people of all faiths to work together? In red rural Ohio he was able to team up with Buddhist, Jewish, Muslim and Christian leaders to speak at a Peace Village each year. He was key in bringing a Zen Buddhist Community to share space in his former church. He also coordinated an anti-racism partnership of churches, other faith communities and colleges efforts for which he received a civil rights award and invitations to speak and help lead community peace and anti-racism discussions involving many faiths. Scott hopes to continue that sort of ecumenical and interfaith work in Nahant and would appreciate help making such connections that members of our church might asked to facilitate.





THERE'S STILL TIME FOR THE LENTEN BOOK STUDY




Rev. Scott will lead a one-hour book study, Wednesday nights, during Lent from March 1 to April 5, at 7 p.m.

GOD BLESS & GODSPEED


