A CELEBRATION OF US!



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

By the time this goes to print I will have preached two sermons relating to how the Nahant Village Church, UCC came to be. The first was on Samuel May who spent the summer of 1820 leading the first worship services in Nahant before he went on to a life dedicated to opposing slavery and racism and sexism.

The second history of the church sermon was on The Nahant Church and the two Eliots (just love that last name!) who led the effort to build the first church in Nahant which was, a summer church for the summer people from Boston.

This month there will be a third history of the church sermon. It will be on the formation of the Village Church for the year-long people which started as a Methodist church, but in 1905 joined the Congregational denomination (one of the denominations that merged to become the United Church of Christ).

These history of the church sermons take place on the second Sunday of the month. We have also provided "history moments" and an old timey hymns on Sundays this summer as we celebrate (post-pandemic) the two hundredth anniversary of the arrival of church worship services in Nahant in 1820.

In August we had special events that we also tied into the 200th Anniversary celebration. We started the month with a wonderful Animal Blessing Service at Marjoram Hill Park. About twenty church members attended with forty or so visitors–and that is not including the two dozen or so dogs and two cats.

Following the Animal Blessing Service we started the Sunday afternoon Overcoming Racism Classes with our partners Nahant Public Library, Essex County Community Organization (ECCO) and First Church in Swampscott, UCC. Twenty-nine people attended the first of five classes and engaged in thoughtful conversation on the difficult topic of racism.

In the middle of August we staffed a booth at the Market by the Sea and held a very well attended yard sale at the church which not only raised \$1,803 but featured the first known photo opportunities with the Nahant Sea Serpent.

In September we will once again host a table at the Market on September 16 and we 'd love to see as many of you as possible there. Then on the weekend of September 30th and October 1st our 200th Anniversary celebration will culminate with a blockbuster open house on the 30th featuring a bake sale, a morning concert on the lawn by Lisa, lunch, a time capsule project, history of the church displays, games, and an afternoon hymn sing, organ recital and organ "tour" and a bells concert. In the evening starting at 5:30 there will be a wine and cheese gala before the 7pm concert by Ayla Brown and Rob Bellamy. Please plan to stop by and join in the festivities– and invite your friends and family and buy tickets to the concert! On October 1 we will have a service with more old timey music, one last history moment and a sermon reflecting on where we've come from, where we are and where we might go in the days ahead with the help of God and each of you.

Thanks to all who have participated in the celebrations so far. As summer winds down I hope more and more of you are able to be a part of the events and do your best to get the word out about the open house and Ayla Brown Concert!

PARDON OUR APPEARANCE ...





DID YOU KNOW?

Over the past few months, I have heard several times, that if for some reason NVC had to close its doors, that any money and property that we may have left goes to the United Church of Christ (UCC). Now that I am off from teaching for the summer, I decided to do a little research on the subject. Here is what I have found out:

What happens to the church, and its assets, is 100% the decision of the church, subject to the approval of the Attorney General's office of Massachusetts. As a Public Charity, the AG's office must ensure that all assets are used in a manner consistent with the donor's intent. Unless the United Church of Christ is named in the bylaws, or church leadership *chooses* to name the UCC as a beneficiary of the assets, the UCC gets **nothing**. Despite what some may believe, the closing of churches is not a stream of income for the conference, or any other setting.

That being said: Sometimes, when churches close, they choose to make a gift to the conference to seed New Church Starts, or to help fund the costs of closing for future churches (as it can cost around \$50,000 to close a church in MA), or to thank the conference for its assistance through the closing process. However, many churches do **not** name the United Church of Christ in their beneficiary plan, and it is not something we expect. UCC Area Conference Minister Alex Shea Will said, if NVC were to ever close, he would work just as hard for us as we would for any other church, "to help you close with grace, thoughtfulness, and faithfulness, because it's our job, not because there is any financial windfall coming our way."

Our bylaws have no closing plan in them, and I do not see us closing NVC anytime soon. I am hoping that this accurate information will stop the rumors and put some people at ease.

NVC IN ACTION

TRUSTEE'S CORNER

The Board of Trustees do not have scheduled meetings during the summer, but remain active behind the scenes and available to deal with issues as they come up.

In June we voted by email to approve a capped budget program for oil delivery from North Shore Fuel, who have been supplying oil and reliable service to the church for several years.

We met jointly with the Church Council on July 6, and voted to have Rex Antrim appoint a bylaws subcommittee to resume work on updating the bylaws this fall.

Following the joint meeting the Trustees voted to formally elect Rex as chair of the Trustees.

The trustees voted also to add Rex as signatory on all the NVC accounts. That has since been accomplished, with thanks to Marrit for coordinating and handling all the necessary paperwork.

The trustees voted also to approve of spending \$12,180.00 for repairs to the organ in the sanctuary.

On July 11, we voted by email to approve the contract with Ambient Entertainment for the September 30 concert with Ayla Brown and Rob Bellamy.

We have kept an eye on projects such as dealing with the rodent infestation and resulting strong odor in the robing room, and also the repair of the chapel windows and walls, and painting the interior and exterior wall.

We are dealing with issues with the Vulcan kitchen range, which has produced excessive heat and unhealthy air in the kitchen and Swansburg Hall. In the short term, the pilots to the ten burners have been

turned off and the pilot on the second oven has been rekindled until we can schedule a service call.

I wish to thank Bill Crawford for his long service on the Board of Trustees, and many years as chairman.

FLEA MARKET SUCCESS

Our Aug. 19th Flea Market fundraiser was a huge success, raising just shy of \$1,900. We are so grateful to everyone who donated items, came to help sort and price, bought and sold items, and set up and breakdown the flea market. Many hands made for light work and it was great to see so much support from our Nahant Community as well. Thank you!


can read music, and can come to weekly rehearsals.


WANTED: VOLUNTEERS FOR **COFFEE HOUR**
